The school system of America he considers the finest in the world, and He believes it to have been largely the safety of the States, in the midst of the con-vulsions through which they have passed. He bolds, too, that religion is now receiving a large element of revival in America, and hoped that the churches of Great Britain would enjoy, as they did after the last re-vival, a visit from its widening waves. He vividly sketched the present condition and future prospects of the freedmen of Amefuture prospects of the freedmen of Ame-rica, showing that whilst necessarily it would take as much brain power, as a whole, as is to be found among their white bretbren, who for ages have been maturing, still, that the black children are as shrewd to learn ordinary lessons, and the black people as quick to appreciate the kindnesses and amenities of life, as are the whites. MISCHIEVOUS BOYS-POLICEMAN AS-SAULTED AND MAN SHOT.-Last evening, about eight o'clock, a gentleman notified Officer Wilcox that some boys had stretched across the sidewalk at Thirty-seventh and Lancaster avenue a wire by which passers-by were thrown down. The gentle-man was covered with mud by falling into the gutter, in consequence of being tripped by the wire. Wilcox went to the place and saw the boys fixing up a rope. He succeeded in capturing two of the juveniles. The pris-oners sounded an alarm, when fathers, methers, sisters and brothers came to their MISCHIEVOUS BOYS-POLICEMAN AS methers, sisters and brothers came to their relief. The officer had a rough time of it. The women came up with stones in their aprons, and the missiles were used pretty freely. Wilcox was beaten and his clothing was torn into shreds. The youthful prisoners were taken away from the policeman. The latter, as a last resort, fired his revolver, and the ball took effect in the shoulder of and the ball took effect in the shoulder of Dennis Scully, causing a painful though not dangerous wound. One of those engaged in the row was arrested at the time. Others were captured afterwards. The prisoners were arraigned before Alderman Allen this morning. Their names are Dennis Scully, Dennis Dennin, Daniel Nagle, Hannah Scully, Timothy Scully, Daniel Dennin, Jas. Ryan, and John O'Bryan. The three last are boys, aged 11 and 14 years. They were sent to the House of Refuge. The others were held in \$1,000 bail, each to answer at Court. Court.
