Two in the same business report over \$91,-000. The second largest income in San Francisco, \$102,911, was that of a quartz miner. The Bulletin adds: "Full returns from the principal mining centres of the State would furnish many similar examples of the wealth derived from successful operations, and would support the idea that the most

THE WISCONSIN STATE PRISON, -The Chicago Republican gives an interesting account of this institution, from which we condense the following items: It is situated at Waupun, nearly in the centre of the State. It is not yet completed, but already presents an imposing appearance. The walls of the prison surround eight acres of ground. These walls are twenty four feet high, three feet thick at the bottom, and two and a half feet thick at the bottom, and two and a half at the top. They are surmounted with iron railings. The front wall is ofiron, the other three of solid stone. The main building, ninety by eighty-five feet, is used for the residence of the officers and their families. It also contains the prison chapel. The cells are on the south wing, which is two hundred and fifty by fifty feet. These cells, two hundred and eighty in all, are arranged in four tiers. They are three feet wide, sevin four tiers. They are three feet wide, seven feet deep, and seven feet high. Great care is taken to keep them clean, and the ventilation is excellent.
