QUARTER SESSIONS—Judge Allison.—After our report of the case of John Mason and George Roberts, charged as principals, and James Bois as accessory before the fact of a larceny, the defence for Bois was opened by Mr. Casaidy, and witnesses were called to prove that on the Sunday before the robbery, the day fixed by Raclam for the receipt of the keys, Mr. Bois was a New York, and remained there until the middle of the following week. The good character of defendant was also shown by a number of witnesses. Haslam's bad character was also put in evidence. The case was resumed this morning.
Governor Foliocit testified that he knew James Bois; first knew him in 1850, when he was under Mr. Welton, the Treasurer at the Mint; he remained until after the appointment of Mr. McIntyre as Treasurer; never heard anything against his character for honesty. never heard anything against his character for honesty.

Mr. Ailmandinger testified that he never knew Mr. Bols's character for honesty questioned.

Henry D. Shaffer testified that he visited New York and examined the register at the hotel, and found that Mr. Bols was in New York on the 28th of February; his character for honesty is good.

Alfred Shuck testified that he resides in Monroe County; knew John Baslam; had known him for two years; his character for truth and wenacity is bad; knew Bols 18 years; his character is good.

Chariton Burnett, Linford Marsh, John D. Young, H. Staples. John E. Storm, George Hughes, Marmaduke Watson, John Bols, Robert Bols testified to the good character of the defendant. The defence closed The Commonwealth recalled Mr. Hess, who testified; I knew Bols very well; on the dirst or second Sunday siter the committal of Mitchell, Bols called at my readence and in conversation remarked that on the Studay before the robbery he was with Mitchell, on Coates street; and saw me and another man coming DP Cates street; that Mitchell told him he did not what to meet me and therefore stepped out of the way; it was true that I was going up Coates street.

Cross-examined by Mr. Cassidy—I can't fax the date of the cunversation; don't know whether it was the first or second Sunday siter the robbery; I know I was going up Coates street on the Sunday before the robbery; because I had not discovered Mitchell's peculations, and was going to Mitchell's to get the keys of the wait; Bols told me he was with Mitchell, on that Sunday. When they saw me coming, and when Mitchell said "There comes two men that I don't want to see."

John W. Stokes sworn—I am in the express business; live in Stroudsburg; know Haslam for five or aix years; never heard his character for truth and veracity brought in question; I would not hesitate to believe him on oath.

Question by Mr. Cassidy—Did you ever hear ene person in Stroudsburg; know Haslam was not a desirable companion; I made this remark shortly after the hearing that his case to the commencement of this suit; would believe him on bath.

Cross-examined—Was never inclimate with him; heard bi

time, never told thr. Snyder that John Haslam was a notorious liar.

James Vallatine, sworn—I live in Stroudsburg: I have known John Haslam sluce 1833; never heard his character for truth and veracity questioned before this occurrence; would believe him on oath.

Cross-examined—Last saw him about a year ago; don't how what his character was during that time, but never heard it questioned; know Altred Shuck; never told him that Haslam was a liar; nothing like it; might have said his character was bad in running around; we heard it, was bad; I might havesaid he was a bad man, but I didn't know it,

George Nye, sworn—I live in Stroudsburg: have known Haslem for eight or nine years: never heard his character for truth and veracity b ought in question. Cross-examined—Lastsawhim in Strondsburg about a year ago; do not know anything about him in that time.

Wil iam Huntsman sworn—I have known Hastem about 10 years; he was living in Strondsburg; don't know much about his character for truth questioned. any thing said about h.s. character for truth questioned. Cross-examined—Knew the people in Strondsburg who khew him; don't know any thing about him since 1865.

Frederick Phillips, aworn—I live in Strondsburg; known Haslam about ten years; neyer heard anything against him except that he was a gambler; never heard anything against his character for truth and

against him except that he was a gambler; never heard anything against his character for truth and veracity.

Cross-examined—Don't know anything about him for the last eighteen months.

Valentine Couch, sworn—Live in Stroudsburg; have nothing against his character for truth and veracity; would believe him on oath. Cross Examined—He left troudsburg two years ago; don't know what he has been doing in that time; don't know what his character is in that time,

Samuel Goforth, sworn—Formerly lived in Strondsburg; saw Haslam first last spring a year ago; didn't hear much about him; never heard anything against his character for truth and veracity; he was well known by the people; I would believe him on oath. Cross-examine—I have not seen him for 18 months. James Gardner testified that Haslam's character for truth and veracity was not very good, and had heard that he was a gambler.

Lewis Myers testified that he never heard Haslam's character broughs into question for truth and veracity. Cross-examine—Heard one mas say he was a liar. The Commonwealth again closed.

The defence received Mr. Valentine. I know Mr. Miller and Mr.Sharck; did not say to them that Haslam was a liar.

Mr. Shuck testified—Mr. Vallentine told me that he could not believe Haslam, as he was such a liar.
The case closed on both sides, and the argument to the jury is proceeding as our report closed.
