WASHINGTON, Nov. 28th.—A despatch received here to-day from New Orleans, states that a numerously signed petition has been sent to Congress. Among the signers are some general officers of the present State Government. The petition asks for the abolition of the present State Government and the appointment of a Provisional Government.

The Fenian difficulties just developed in Ireland will, it is believed by Secretary Seward, result in a rigid enforcement of the sentence of death against those now awaiting the action of the British government in Canada.

The Occupation of Matamoras Unauthorized by the Government.

FENIAN EXCITEMENT AT BUFFALO. THE CHOLERA AT PALERMO.

CHOLERA ON SHIPBOARD. The Latest Financial Intelligence.

> From Washington. WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—The occupation of Matamoras, by the United States troops, if true, was without any authority or approval from either General Sheridan or the

Government. Last night a despatch was received by Gen. Grant from Gen. Sheridan, stating that the latter had been informed that Gen. Sedgwick contemplated such a movement, and that orders had been immediately forwarded by telegraph to arrest it, as an un-

authorized and unwarranted proceeding. Gen. Sheridan stated that if the move. ment was made before the telegraphic order reached the officer in command he should instantly relieve the latter from duty. It is believed that Gen. Sedgwick was in-

duced to take this step by the importunities of parties in Matamoras who had compromised themselves by affiliation with the Imperialists, and desired protection. The proceeding is totally disapproved by the military and civil authorities here.

The Fenian Excitement.
