From Central and South America. NEW YORK, Dec. 10 .- Panama dates of the 3d inst. have been received by the steamer Rising Star.

The forty-fifth anniversary of the Independence of the Isthmus has been celebrated during the week by receptions by the President, military reviews, salutes, masquer. ades, &c. The frigate Powhatan saluted the Columbian flag, and Admiral Pearson visited the President.

There was a heavy gale at Aspinwall on December 1st, but no damage is reported. The British steamer Danube arrived at Aspinwall November 22d, with three cases

of yellow fever on board. The steamer California, from Liverpool, had arrived at Aspinwall.

The ship Aroostook, with ice, from Boston, had also arrived.

#### Arrival of the Rising Star. [To the New York Associated Press.]

New York, Dec. 10.—The steamer Rising Star, from Aspinwall, arrived here this morning, and brings \$1,263,113 in treasure. The Rising Star brings dates to the 2d from Panama.

There was much talk in Chile of making war on Spain. The allied squadron was still at Valparaiso, preparing to go to sea It is believed that the destination of the fleet is Manilla, to intercept at that place, if possible, some of the Spanish vessels that put in for repairs after the defeat at Callao. A slight shock of earthquake was felt a

Valparaiso on the night of the 8th of No vember, but caused no damage. From Peru there is but little of interest The Dictator seems to be conducting affairs

in that Republic with great ability. The different attempts at revolution seem to have failed. The five republics of Central America are

at peace, consequently there is no news from The recent sittings of the extra session of Congress in Chile terminated in the defeat

of the opponents of the Government. A disastrous fire occurred in Santiago, Chile, on the 2d of October. The market place, with all its stalls, &c., was destroyed. The amount of property destroyed was very large, and the losses fall chiefly upon the poor trading people.

Colonel Balto and the other expatriated Peruvians have taken up their residence in Santiago.

The steamer Cyclone, which was reported to have been captured by the Spaniards, arrived at Valparaiso on the 5th of Nevember. NEW YORK, Dec. 10.—Steamer Rising Star, from Aspinwall, has arrived. She has \$1,263,113 in treasure. Messrs. Jane & Co., of Guayaquil, have not

suspended, as reported.

The steamer Nouveau Monde, from St.

Nazaire, France, arrived at Aspinwall on Dates from Lima and Callao are to Nov. 15th and 23d. Peru was tranquil. The Government has definitely declined the arbitration of England and France in the Spanish imbroglio. The Peruvian Minister had returned from Chile. The allied squadron was at Valparaiso under sealed sailing

orders. A slight earthquake was felt at Valparaiso on Nov. 8th.

The city of Santiago, Chile, was visited by a fire on the 2d ult., burning the market place, and causing ruin to numerous poor families.

The Peruvian revolutionists have been expatriated to Chile.
Central America was quiet. The coffee

season had commenced in Costa Rica.

Fire near Burlington, Vt. To New York Associated Press.

BURLINGTON, Vt., Dec. 9.—The extensive dye-house of the Burlington Woolen Company, at Winooski, was totally destroyed by fire this morning. The fire was discovered about five o'clock, and the flames were only prevented from reaching the main building through the persistent efforts of the Ethan Allen Engine Company of this city, and the use of four large force pumps in the mills. The dye-house contained a large quantity of wool and though fully insared the loss is estimated to be about \$60,-600. Some slight casualities occurred by the falling of the dye-house. These mils, which are among the largest in New England, and have employed about eight hundred hands, are necessarily obliged to

suspend operations for a few weeks, in order

to repair machinery. The origin of the fire

is supposed to be accidental.

Fire in Columbia. COLUMBIA, Dec. 9.—A destructive fire at this place occurred last night, at 101 o'clock. Several buildings were destroyed, among which were the business houses of J. M. Houston, dry goods, a total loss; Messrs. Williams' drug store, partly insured; Herstein & Co., dry goods and clothing, a part of the stock saved; Burch & Aiken, dry goods, a part of the stock saved and fully insured; and Ballard saloon, the name of the owner unknown, and the total loss is unknown. Owing to a lack of fire apparatus and water, the flames spread rapidly, and were checked only by tearing down four frame buildings. The aggregate losses are estimated at \$100,000 to \$150,000, with comparatively little insurance.

Fire in Nashville. [To the N. Y. Associated Press.]
NASHVILLE, Dec. 9.—The extensive sash, blind and door manufactory of James Simons, was destroyed by fire last night about midnight. Several of the adjoining

buildings were badly damaged. The loss is about \$30,000 and no insurance. Judge Kelley's Bill.

Santa Anna Again Heard From.

(Special Despatch to the Bulletin.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 10, 1866.-A number of leading capitalists from New York, including the Astors, arrived here to-day. The object of their visit is understood to be as to the probabilities of an impeachment of the President.
