JUDGE KELLEY'S REVENUE BILL.

PROSPECT OF ITS FAILURE. FROM SAN FRANCISCO.

The Defenders of Mexico.

From Washington.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—A bill was introduced by Mr. Kelley, of Pennsylvania, looking to the creation of a Department of Internal Revenue. It aims to take the control of the revenue from the Treasury; but there are doubts whether it can become a law. The bill is, at present, in the hands of the Committee of Ways and Means, and even if reported upon favorably by that body, and passed by Congress, it would be certain to receive Executive veto. In that event, the Senate would sustain the veto. and the bill would fail. The impression is. however, that the bill will never reach Congress, but that it will be smothered in the Committee.

Much discussion out of Congress upon the bill looking to the abrogation of the State governments at the South, and the opponents of the measure are confident they can defeat it in the Senate, where a two-thirds vote over the veto could not be secured.

The French Evacuation. WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—The President is displeased with the tenor of Napoleon's reply to the cable telegram from the State Department, calling upon him to fulfill his promise and withdraw his troops from Mexico in installments. The Cabinet, with but one exception, it is understood, side with the President. It is considered doubtful, however, whether any further remonstrance will be made, and the probabilities are that the French Emperor will be allowed to have his own way. Indirectly, it is hinted, that Napoleon's action in refusing to withdraw, is mainly because of what he regards a violation of the pledge of neutrality, or non-interference on our part, his position being that by the arrest of Gen. Ortego, the despatch of Gen. Sherman, and other objectional movements, our pledge of neutrality is broken and the compact is withdrawn and null and void.
