The Bounty to Colored Soldiers.

In answer to inquiries made by Colonel C. D. Penne-backer, Military Agent of the State of Kentucky, un-der date of December 3, 1865, whether or not, under any law of decision. colored soldiers are entitled to bounty when ensisted from the 19th of June. 1864, to the 4th day of July, 1864, the Second Comptroller made the following reply:
