

Exc. 4. That in pursuance of the power vested in the Councils of Philadeiphia by "A further supplement to an Act to Incorporate the City of Philadeiphia," approved April 17, 1861, there shall be the following allowance made to the payers of taxes, and pensity added for the non-payment by the Receiver of Taxes, to wit: At the rate of twelve per cent. per annum from the date of the payment until the first day of January, if paid before the first day of September; then an addition of two per cent shall be added to and payable on the same.
