

Ristori. 'The other actors and actresses were also good. Too much cannot be said of this drams, as represented by the Ristori troupe, and it will gratify the public to know that it is to be repeated at the farewell matinée, to be given next Saturday, the sale of seats for which will begin tomorrow.

This evening Mme. Ristori will appear as "Deborah" in Mosenthal's great drama, known here as Leah. This is said to be as great a part for her as "Elizabeth," the plot, at the same time, being more interesting. To-morrow evening Mary Stuart will be repeated, and on Wednesday evening the great artist will appear as "Lady Macbeth," to see her in which there is great curiosity. On Friday evening her benefit will take place, when she will, it is said, appear in a drama that has not heretofore been produced in America.

The First Symphony Concert. There was a large and appreciative audience at the Musical Fund Hall, on Saturday evening, at the First Symphony concert of Messrs, Jarvis & Schmitz. The first piece on the bill was the overture, called the "Carnaval Romain," by Berlioz, well-written and massive, but as deficient in melody as most of the works of the writer and his school. It was extremely well played, the orchestra being full and well-trained. The Mozart aria, sung by Mr. Taylor, "Per questa bella mano," and a good song by Abt, were well received. The Concert-Sutck, by Weber, was admirably played by Mr. Jarvis and the orchestra.

Besthoven's Seventh Symphony was given entire for the second part of the concert. Mr. Schmitz had his fine or-chestra thoroughly in hand, and he is to be congratulated on the complete success of this his first attempt to conduct a full erchestra through a long symphony. 


