FIRE AT PORTLAND, MAINE. Burning of a Railroad Depot INTERESTING FROM WASHINGTON. NEWS FROM HARRISBURG AFFAIRS IN CANADA.

Fire at Portland. (By the N. Y. Associated Press.) PORTLAND, Dec. 18.—The stone ware manufactory of F. A. Plstedt, in Farmingdale, was burned on Sunday evening. Loss ten thousand dollars, insured for five thousand. The railroad depot at Yarmouth Junction was burned yesterday afternoon. Loss unknown.

From Washington. (To New York Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—In the Board of Aldermen, Mr. Magruder introduced a joint resolution, praying Congress to repeal all acts establishing the present method of government for the District of Columbia, and asking for the appointment of commissioners, and for a consolidation of municipalities under them. The matter was referred to a special committee.

The proposals called for by the Indian Bureau for furnishing the Indian tribes throughout the West with goods, etc., have been laid before the Secretary of the Interior for his approval. It is expected that a decision will be had in a day or two.

The Mississippi Levees. NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 18.—No bids have been received for the purchase of \$1,000,000 worth of levee bonds, advertised for last week. The failure is said to have been owing to the fact that the law prohibits the sale of these securities at less than par.
