FAILURE OF THE BURGLARS.

They could not Drill the Spiegel Eisen.

On Saturday evening, the 3d of November, our bank was entered by burglars. The office of the bank being without an occupant, they had undisputed possession, and I have no doubt employed their time uninterruptedly till morning. In efforts to reach the treasure of the bank.
