Disastrous Fire in Vicksburg. A despatch from Vicksburg, Miss., Dec. 24th, says—A terrific fire brake out in Mo. ris' Block, at the corner of Clay and Front levee, at eight o'clock last night, destroying the entire block of thirty houses, thence to the block bounded by Leves Clay, Mulberry and Crawford streets. The entire block of thirty-three houses was destroyed Thence east of Mulberry, between Crawford and Clay streets, to Washington, destroying thirteen houses; thence to the corner of Washington and Crawford streets, destroying four three-story buildings. It then spread to the corner of Mulberry and Crawford streets destroying ten houses; in all ford streets, destroying ten houses; in all about one hundred buildings, of which thirty-eight were large brick stores.

Two white children and four negroes perished in the flames, and six negroes were killed accidentally. One hundred families are houseless. The fire resulted from carelessness in Meyers's bar-room. The pulldings and atreets care; crowded with debris and goods. Great credit is due to Generals Dudley and Wood, and their men, for their superhuman efforts to subdue the flames and prevent pillage. Five or six buildings were blown up to arrest the progress of the flames. The theatre caught fire but the City Bank and telegraph office escaped.

The former is badly damaged.

The total loss is estimated at \$2,000,000, about one-fourth of which is insured.

Jacquith, Johnson & Lamkin, W. Hartman. The fire raged until daylight. The Phoenix Fire Company lost their engine.

THE IMAUM OF MUSCAT.-A rather amusing affair took place shortly after the com-mencement in the summer of nostilities netween Syed Selem, Imaum of Muscat, and Syed Toorkey, claimant of that dignity. Syed Selem to protect himself against his enemy, built a barricade of bags of rice and dates across the eastern part of the town. Syed Toorkey, being very short of provisions, made a desperate sortie from Fort Jelalli, which he held, carried off the entire barricade, and lived for some time upon it. Syed Selem made another little mistake. He called upon some of the wild tribes of Arabs in the interior to come and aid him; but, upon second thoughts, he came to the conclusion that they might prove harder to get rid of than Syed Toorkey, so he recalled his invitation, and placed guns in all the roads to keep back his allies if they should
