

The Fenian Trials.

SWERBBERG, C. E., Dec. 26.—The jury in the case of McDonald, who were looked up over Christmas, not being able to agree, were discharged. It is understood that eleven were for conviction and one for acquittal.

Mr. Devlin then addressed the jury, after which the Judge gave in his charge. After an hour's deliberation they returned with a verdict of guilty.

Terence McDonald was then put upon trial for robbery. Smith was sentenced to be hanged on the 1st of January.

The evidence in McDonald's case is the same as before. The jury, after a long deliberation, failed to agree and were discharged.

Beardon was put on trial for invasion. The Judge directed the jury to discharge him on the ground of a wrong indictment.

Michael Crowley was then tried on the same evidence, but at 9 P. M. the jury had failed to agree, and the Court adjourned.

From Havana. The steamer Moro Castle has arrived with Havana dates to the 22d.

A financial crisis prevailed. Several banks have suspended specie payments and closed their doors. A general crash was expected.

Advices from Mexico state that Maximilian had divided the country into four military districts, and that the Emperor, Maximilian, was to remain in his present situation.

The steamer Stars and Stripes had arrived from Philadelphia. A private letter says that owing to the stupidity of the Spanish Consul at Havana, the Stars and Stripes would probably be sent to quarantine.

REMARKABLE HISTORICAL DISCOVERY.—Samuel de Champlain, the noble founder of Canada, was buried at Quebec two hundred and thirty years ago, and the place of his interment has remained a mystery.

Maloney, who robbed a paymaster of over \$8,000, last Sunday, was sentenced by a court-martial to hard labor in the penitentiary, escaped with two other convicts last night.

These familiar with Quebec will remember the long stairway which descends from Montpelier street to Champlain street. Near the foot of this stairway was the spot which two archeologists had been led to believe was the site of the tomb.

It only remained to inquire into the bones engaged in building the aqueduct which crosses the river. It was discovered in the progress of the work.

They went to Mr. O'Donnell, Assistant Engineer of the Water Works, who had superintended this part of the structure. He replied promptly that an ancient vessel had been found at the foot of the stairs.

It contained a quantity of human bones, and that he was so much struck with the character of the discovery that he had included a section of the vault with measurements and other indications concerning it, in one of his plans.

Mr. O'Donnell could not tell what had become of them. It appeared on further inquiry that they had been given to the Abbe Langevin, the priest of a neighboring parish, well known in Canada as the author of several antiquarian and historical publications.

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He directed the spot to be marked but that it seems neglected, for when it was heard that the box had not yet been found, though an attempt to that end had been made. There can be no doubt that the bones will soon be recovered, and that the remains of the founder of Canada will be honored with a monument worthy of him.

MEDICAL LECTURE.—The Boston Herald says that the Medical Faculty of Harvard University gave their customary lecture to the students in that branch of instruction, Thursday evening at the Revere House, and a larger number than usual gathered to enjoy the hospitalities. The President and Professors of the College were there, and with them were the leading members of the medical profession in Boston.

A most pleasant evening was passed by the students in social converse, music, and in the discussion of an elegant collation. All retired heartily gratified with the entertainment. The medical class of the present term numbers one hundred and eighty, a larger number than have ever entered before.

A SIAMER COLOSSUS.—The Bangkok Recorder describes a visit to one of the Wat P.O. Bhuddist cloisters of the city, the Wat P.O., which is the largest. It covers ten acres of land, paved with gray granite, and presents the difficulties of a labyrinth.

It contains two temples of imposing architecture. In one is an image twice the size of life, and covered with heavy gold, in the other a head resting on the right hand. He is 135 feet long, about 25 feet around the belt, and the length of the little toe on the right foot is 3 feet 4 inches.

The natives say his bowels are full of large water jars. The labor of constructing and gilding this image must have been immense, and have taken years of time. The nearest approach to this in the East is the image of Buddha in the Lateran. In the former the figures which support the holy water basins on entering look like infants, but in the size of adults, while the saints towards the roof are in reality three times the size of life.
