THE TENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY.—The arrangements for the Tenth General Assembly, to take place in this city next month, have been nearly completed, and have been made upon the most extensive scale. Eighty-three societies from abroad have signified their intention of participating in the festival. Of that number 34 are from New York City, 7 from Baltimore, 6 from Jersey City, Hoboken, Williamsburg, Hudson City, Albany, Auburn and Buffalo, N. Y.; Egg Harbor City, N. J.; Erie, Pa.; Elizabeth City, N. J.; Elizabeth, N. Y.; Hamilton, C. W.; Hartford, Conn.; Hoboken, N. J.; Hazleton, Pa.; Lancaster, Pa.; New Haven, Conn.; Orange, N. J.; Pittsburgh, Pa.; Pottsville, Pa.; Providence, R. I.; Poughkeepsie, N. Y.; Reading, Pa.; Richmond, Va.; Staten Island, N. Y.; Syracuse, N. Y.; Rochester, N. Y.; Washington, D. C.; Wilmington, Del.; Camden, N. J. The National Guards' Hall has been selected for the general headquarters, and it will be most elaborately decorated. The programme of the festival, as it has been agreed upon, is as follows:

Saturday, July 13.—The reception of the visiting delegations will take place. After reaching here, the strangers will be met by the Committee on Reception, and will be escorted to the various delegations which will meet at the National Guards' Hall, and march to Walnut street wharf to receive the New York singers. The arrival of the latter will be announced by a firing of rockets from Smith's Island Salutes will then be fired. After the New Yorkers have landed, the procession will be reformed and will be marched to Independence Square, where the addresses of welcome will take place. The addresses of welcome will be made by Mayor McMichael, in English, and by Dr. G. Koller, in German. The resident singers will then give the choruses. "Welcome," and then the choir will march up Fifth street to Race, and thence to headquarters, where the visiting delegations will deliver their flags into the safe-keeping of the Philadelphia committee.

Sunday, July 14.—The festival will be a general festival, but each party will be allowed to spend the day in such manner as they may consider proper. Monday, July 15.—At nine o'clock, A. M. there will be a meeting at headquarters, and at ten o'clock a rehearsal at the Academy of Music for the Grand Festival Concert, which is to be given there in the evening, at eight o'clock. FRANKLIN INSTITUTE.—The regular Monthly meeting was held as usual in the lecture room of the Institute. After the reading of minutes, and reports of Standing Committees, the Report of the Special Committee appointed to frame an Ordinance providing for the inspection of steam engines and boilers, was read, and the ordinance, with a few slight alterations, was on motion adopted section by section, and as a whole. Substantially a copy having been informally furnished to the Committee on Law of the Council, to facilitate its securing speedy action, the necessity for which has been so fearfully announced by the horrible disaster of Sanson street. The only changes made were a verbal correction, and the change of the salary assigned to the assistant inspectors, from \$1,300 per annum to \$1,200 for the first year, \$1,300 for the second, \$1,400 for the third, and \$1,500 for the fourth and succeeding years. A resolution was passed, directing the Secretary to transmit a copy of the ordinance to the Committee on Law, with the request to bring the same before Council as speedily as possible. Another resolution was also passed, expressing the sense of the Institute as entirely opposed to the use of lock-up safety valves, as decidedly injurious and detrimental to the country which was their proper object to obtain, as among other things they were sure in, a short time, to become firmly fixed in their seats. The report of the Resident Secretary on Novelties in Science and the Mechanic Arts was also read and contained many things of interest for which we have no space, and for which we must refer our readers to the Institute's monthly Journal, edited by Prof. Norton.
