Madison Place, on Fiftcenth street, and did reside there in April 1865; General Augur's headquarters was just below my residence; on the night of April 14th, 1865, I was in my own room, which adjoins that of my father, in the third story the house; the house fronts on Lafayette Squar my father's room was in the front part of the nouse, and my own room adjoins his.
