She wants me to baptize a dying child. I go up a dirty alley, up a dirty pair of stairs, into a dirty room, and find a poor emaciated child gasping for breath. I baptize the little one in the name of the Holy Trinity amidst the howls of profanity ascending from without. Coming down, I saw a young woman. I asked, "Do you live here?" "Yes, sir," "Are you married?" "No, sir, I have a man." "Wo man," said I, "why don't you get married?" you married?" "No, sir, I have a man." "Yo man," said, I, "why don't you get married?" "Don't want to, sir." "Don't you know that it is wrong to live this way?" No answer and blank astonishment.
