Life in Florida. The following letter from a Philadelphia lady, who was distinguished for her patriotic devotion during the war, will be read with interest: Brown Oaks, Mellenville, Orange County, August 26, 1867.—Dr. Thomas Wistar—Dean Sie:—Are you aware of our removal from Philadelphia, and that we are living in Florida?

It is even so—although it still seems more like

It is even so—although it still seems more like the vagaries of a dream than a reality. We sold out and came here in April—here being some six miles from Mellenville, on Lake Monroe, through which the St. John's river runs. We are living in tents, in the midst of a pine forest—our nearest neighbor two miles away. This pioneering is a fard life, but we hope to be fully recompensed. In four or five years our orange grove will probably yield us more than a competency. We intend to raise oranges, lemons, bananas and pine-apples. The climate fine; the air is pure, and almost as exhibitating as champagne. The heat of the sin would be overpowering were it not for the fine breeze which commences about nine of dock and generally continues all day. The nights, too, are cool. We have not relt or suffered from the heat as much as we did in Philadelphia.

cool. We have not telt or suffered from the near as much as we did in Philadelphia.

We make slow progress with clearing and building—for the "poor white trash" are lazy beyond belief, and there are very few colored people. We have great difficulty in procuring laborers; their custom is to work three or four days, with the proceeds buy a sack of corn, and live on that until exhausted, when they work long enough to buy another. Their gardening consists of a good-sized potato-patch, and sometimes a few beans or pumpkins—nothing else. We cannot buy any vegetables at any price, times a few beans or pumpkins—nothing else.
We cannot buy any vegetables at any price, although my son M., who has been ill for two months with billous fever, longs for them, and has no appetite for other food.
The people seem to have lost all energy (if they ever had any), and make little or no effort beyond a mere sustaining of life. "Preacher Powell," the father of Payne, the assassin of Lincoln, is a neighbor. Another son, a bitter rebel, is living in poverty in consequence of his belief in the "dissolution of the government, and belief in the "dissolution of the government, and the general break-up of the whole country." He sits on his fences smoking a pipe, and lets his farm go to ruin, and his wife and children want for bread, because, as he says, "it's no use doing anything, we may never see the crops."

Were it not for the military rule, it is more than probable we would be hunted off, if not shot down—think they so little of taking human life here. "The Regulators" doom men (or used to from private animosity. But this often) merely from private animosity. But this is too beautiful a land, too favored a spot to be given up to such a worthless set. Emigration tends this way, and it is what we want. A number of families come to our immediate vicinity. this fall and winter, from Wisconsin, Ohio, Penn

sylvania, Georgia, &c., and we hope soon to have schools, churches, and civilization. With northern enterprise and energy this can be made a perfect Eden. Some colored people are taking home-steads, teo, and I doubt not we can have them work for us ere long. We have one man and his wife, and they are sending for other relations. But a school must be established if they come, for all are anxious to learn. I have a young friend now in Philadelearn.

plearn. I have a young friend now in Philadelphia who is anxious to come here; he is a married
man, and well educated. Do you think some of
the societies would pay him a moderate salary to
teach the freedmen? There are numbers of then
at New Smyrna and Enterprise, in want, who
can be induced to locate here with a school in
prospect. The gentleman to whom I allude is H.
B. Murkland (late of the 72d Pennsylvania Volunteers), with Merchant & Co., 424 South Delaware avenue. I doubt not the colored people will gladly pay half their schooling; but they are too poor to do

more, anxious as they are.

I merely intended letting you know my whereabouts, not having time for a farewell call, though I did visit your office during your absence.
