The Loss of the John T. Ford. The Loss of the John T. Ford.

Details are published of the loss of the little schooner John T. Ford, which left Baltimore for Paris on the 22d of June last. During the voyage the John T. Ford spoke several ships, and occasionally met with bad weather. On the afternoon of the 5th inst. a sea struck the boat, and she turned over, but righted again almost immediately. She lost all her oil, however, which was necessary for the light at her compass, and the crew suffered much from cramp and the loss of water. M., a terrific sea struck the boat and turned her over, and the ballast boards being gone, the ballast shifted, and was thrown into the water, and the boat kept turning right over as the four hands endeavored to get on her, until the lad, got entangled between the rigging and the mast, and she was so kept steady. The men were in this position until noon of the following day, being frequently washed off by the seas, when a sall was observed bearing down upon them, and for a time they were in hopès of being relieved. The sail, however, passed by without rendering them help. The mate Stening then asked Armstrong and the survivors to pray with him, and they continued so so for some time. In a very exhausted and almost insensible condition he was taken off the bottom of the boat and got on board the Aerolite, where he received every bindings and attention.
