Under the head of scientific subjects, some beautiful experiments of scientific subjects, some betatute exponents were shown by means of the powerful lantern which Prof. Morton has had constructed for these purposes. These experiments were to illustrate the circulation developed in fluids by heat, a subject so important in connection with the construction of steam boilers and the ventilation of buildings. This subject, so difficult to illustrate to a large audience, was here demonstrated in a manner at once perfectly clear and emi-nently beautiful. The apparatus devised for this purpose by Professor Morton will be used, we understand, in some lectures to be delived. ered on "Ventilation," by Mr. L. W. Leeds, at the Institute this winter. The production of ozone, by the action of electricity, was also deozone, by the action of electricity, was also do monstrated before the meeting, and various experiments, bearing upon its application to bleaching sugar, &c., were shown. This subject has excited great attention abroad.
