Levi Silliman Ives, formerly Bishop of the Protestant Episcopal Church of North Carolina, and widely known for his religious writings, philanthropic works and conversion to the Roman Catholic faith, died at his residence at Manhattanville, at two o'clock yesterday afternoon, in the seventy-first year of his age.

Mr. Ives was born in Meridien, Conn., on the 16th of September, 1707. At an early age he residence hived until he attained his fifteenth year when he was sent to the academy at Low-ville. During the last months of the war with Great Britain he served is the army, but upon the return of peace went back to school, entering Hamilton College in 1816. At first he studied for the ministry of the Presbyterian Church: but before he was ordained illness compelled him to leave the college, and upon his recovery to health his religious views became changed and he allied himself with the Protestant Episcopal denomination. In 1820 he removed to New York, where he studied the ology under Bishop Hobart, who ordained him in August, 1822. Three years later (1825) he married Rebecca, a daughter of the Bishop. After his ordination his first mission was to Batavia, Genessee county: subsequently he took charge of Trinity church, in Philadelphia, where he was ordained to the priesthood by Bishop White, and in 1827 removed to Lancaster, Pa., and officiated at Christ church. During the next year he returned to New York, and served as assistant minister at Christ church for about six months, when he became rector of St. Luke's, in this city. Here he remained until he was consecrated Bishop of North Carolina, in 1831 While in North Carolina he became quite popular for his efforts in behalf of education and his success in providing for the spiritual welfare ne was consecuted in the was consecuted in the second quite popular for his efforts in behalf of education and his success in providing for the spiritual welfare of the slaves. He also became widely known as a theological author, from his works on the "Apostles' Doctrine and Fellowship," and the "Obedience of Faith," published in New York in 1849. When the excitement on the Oxford tracts broke out in the Episcopal church he strongly sided with the tractarian movement, and this position caused his alienation from his diocese. The fact was that he had doubted the truth of the Protestant faith for a long time, and in 1852, while on a visit to Rome, openly the truth of the Protestant faith for a long time, and in 1852, while on a visit to Rome, openly renounced his faith and was admitted to the Catholic Church. This conversion on his part was severely denounced by the Protestant religious papers in the United States, and upon his return he defended the act in a work entitled, "The Trials of a Mind in its Progress to Catholicism" (London and Boston, 1864). After his return to America, he became Professor of Rhetoric in St. Joseph Theological Seminary, and lectured turn to America, ne occame Professor of Regione in St. Joseph Theological Seminary, and lectured in the Convents of the Sacred Heart and the Sis-ters of Charity. He also occasionally lectured in public, and served as an active President of a con-ference of St. Vincent de Paul.
