NEW PUBLICATIONS.

Miss Alice Cary is a clever woman and a good poetess. But being a woman and a poetess does not qualify her to write a man's love story. Her very pretty volume, published by Ticknor & Fields, and called "A Lover's Diary," is made up of fragments meant to express a man's love in various consecutive stages. It is rather a merit in Miss Cary, and a credit to her womanhood, that she has failed to express this truly. There is nothing virile in her verse or her sentiments. They are both pretty, and at times impressive, but they are thoroughly feminine. The vague personages of the diary, "Charley" and "Mona," have no individuality, and their story has no interest. But they serve the author's purpose of expressing in musical lines her graceful ideas of a passion which she may have feltas a woman, but concerning which, as felt by the other sex, she can only know by report or imagination. There are many extremely pretty things in the volume; but all seem like faint echoes or timid imitations of things that have been better said before. One of the prettiest and most impressive, entitled "Mona Sick," has,like many others, gone through the newspapers separately before,

out we copy it here:
"The sun is set, but there falls no dew;
"The year is old and the moon is new;
My fate is cruel, my heart, is true,
And I sit in the silence and think of you,
My dearest, dear little heart. but we copy it here:

"I sit in the silence and watch the skies, As the tender red of the evening dies; My fate is cruel, but faith defies The dreary night that between us lies.

"All the dreaming is broken through;
Both what is done and undone I rue;
Nothing is steadfast, nothing true,
But your love for me, and my leve for you.

"With the waves that ebb, with the waves that flow, When the winds are loud, when the winds are low, When the roses come, when the roses go, One thought, one feeling, is all I know.

"The time is weary, the year is old;
The light o'the lily burns close to the mould;
The grave is cruel, the grave is cold,
But the other is side is the city of gold."

The refrain, "my dearest, dear little heart," belongs to each verse, but it weakens the poem, which is otherwise very pretty. There are many touching thoughts, pretty images and clever concelts scattered through the book, which will be a popular one for the sake of these, as well as for the handsome style in which it has been published. There are some good illustrations in it, by Hennessy, McEntee and others.

Harper's Pictorial History of the Great Rebellion is advancing steadily and well. We have received Nos. 21, 22, 23 and 24. These contain accounts, well written and well illustrated, of the Chattanooga, Vicksburg, Chancellorsville, Gettysburg and Meridian campaigns. The battle scenes, maps, portraits and other illustrations are very good. The work, when completed, will be invaluable to the future historian, and it is even now extremely interesting. The form is folio. A few more numbers will complete the work.

Harper & Brothers have issued the novel of "Circe," which appeared in Miss Braddon's Magazine, Belgravia, where it was said to be by "Babington White." It was really stolen from the French, Miss Braddon herself being said to be the thief. The discovery of the theft has created a good deal of scandal, which helps the sale of the book. Moreover it is really a very interesting story.
