

In the years 1864 and 1865 the meteors returned in such growing numbers that on the latter occasion about two thousand me-teors must have been visible at Greenwich, and almost as great a number was counted in America. In the great star shower of last year about eight thousand meteors were counted at Greenwich, and at least an equal multitude of Scabella and falling stars was visible at the same


