CRIME.

The Lash and Pillory Shocking Scenes at Georgetown. Bussex A correspondent at Georgetown. Sussex county, Delaware, communicates the following statement relative to the whipping of the persons convicted at the recent term of Court: He says: The whipping of Thomas Oliver, the negro who pleaded guilty of assaulet on two white women, was entrusted to the hands of Jim Wingste, a notorious character, well-known for his fiendish hatred to the black people. The punishment was 60 lashes. Thirty of these were inflicted in the morning. The instrument employed was a cowhide, which was used with such fury that the blood flowed at every cut, causing the fellow to utter the most piteous screams. It is even asserted that some persons held his feet to keep him from giving way to his agony, while the Sheriff looked on with complacency. The man was again brought out in the afternoon, and the lashes were reversed, across his back, making cross-bars. The wounds were afterwards washed with brine. It is declared to be the most horrid punishment ever inflicted in the State, and the shricks and strokes of the lash were heard at a distance of nearly 150 yards. The better class of Democrats declare themselves disgusted. There is no doubt that Oliver will additionally be convicted, at another Court, of rape, for which, it being a capital offence, he will be hung. This torture is therefore a more preliminary to his execution.

On the same day, J. P. Jones (white), convicted of forgery, was brought out for punishment, he being sentenced to stand in the pillory an hour, beside imprisonment, fine, wearing a convict's jacket, &c. He seemed almost frenzied at the thought of the degradation he was to undergo, and begged the bailiffs to shoot him. By frantic exertions he succeeded in breaking away and ran some one hundred yards, when he fell from exhaustion. He was taken back and underwent the punishment. Wilmington Commercial, Nov. 7th.

Whereas, The grant of privileges by this and other States to Railroad Corporations was designed for the beaefit of the Public, no iess than for that of said Corporations; therefore, Resolved, That Railroad Corporations should, at all times, furnish sufficient cars for the rapid transportation of merchandise, and that in the event of their failing to do this, and of any discrimination in their charges against the cities of this State, we recommend that the right to put freight cars upon the road be taken from them by the Legislature, and transferred to individuals, as soon as possible.

Legislature, and transferred to passage of a plain, liberal possible.

Resolved, That we demand the passage of a plain, liberal and comprehensive Free Railroad law, in opposition to railroad monopoly and consolidation.

Resolved, That the aid of Congress be invoked to provide such legislation for the government of great through lines of koadlas the States are inadequate to furnish, and so to secure uniform privileges to our whole people everywhere throughout the country.
