The congregation has already purchased the ground and built the chapel at a cost of about seventy-two thousand dollars, which has all been paid. They now propose to build the church at the corner of Broad and Arch streets, (extending the roof over the chapel,) of pure white marble, with a marble spire two hundred and twenty-seven feet high (227). The main room will accommedate about 1,260 people; the structure will be finished in the most elegant style. Work has already been commenced upon the church, and it will be pushed on to completion as rapidly as possible. tion as rapidly as possible.
