This balance will be made by first crediting the manufacturers with the amount of goods on hand which have been reported as made, but which have not been sold, consumed or used, nor such a removal made of thom as caused the tax to accrue at the time of removal from the place of manufacture; and then with a final assessment, which should immediately be made, or as soon as the manufacturers have had time to receive accounts of all sales made by agents or others, prior to April 1st, to cover the difference between the debtor and credit pages of the ledger.

Assessors are especially enjoined to see that all sales of manufactured goods made by agents prior to April 1st, but not reported to their prin-This balance will be made by first crediting the

sales of manufactured goods made by agents prior to April 1st, but not reported to their principals on or before that date, are subsequently reported and assessed for taxation.

These assessments may be made at any time and entered upon special lists, and certified or returned to the collector. But it is desirable that all of these old accounts should be closed up with as little delay as possible.

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
