Of that number 44 were whites and 5 blacks. The diseases were: Variola, 18; varioloid, 27; rubeola, 5; vancella, 1; cholera, 1; no disease, 1. The nativities of the patients were: United States, 34: Ireland, 5; Germany, 5; Eugland, 4; Brazll, 2; Portugal, 2; Nova Scotia, 1. Of the cases under treatment 7 proved fatal.


