

CITY BULLETIN.

PHILADELPHIA CATTLE MARKET, May 4, 1893.—Beef cattle were in fair demand this week at about former rates. About 1,300 head arrived and sold at 10 1/2 to 11 1/2 cts. for fair to good do. and 60c to 65c for the common as to quality. The following are the particulars of the sales:

Sheep were also in demand; 8,000 head sold at 6 1/2 to 7 1/2 cts. for fair to good do. and 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 cts. for the common as to quality. Hogs were dull and lower; 3,500 head sold at 12 1/2 to 13 1/2 cts. for fair to good do. and 11 1/2 to 12 1/2 cts. for the common as to quality.

ALLEGED SWINDLERS.—John Corlies and W. H. Dolé were arrested by Detective Levy this morning, upon the charge of obtaining goods under false pretences. It is alleged that Dolé went to the store of Craven & Hunt, perfumers, No. 418 Callowhill street, and after inquiring about the commissions allowed for the sale of goods, bought a bill amounting to nearly \$700. Corlies, No. 119 South Second street, is alleged to have ordered the goods to be sent to the store of J. P. Corlies, No. 119 South Second street, (New York) broker. Mr. Hunt went to New York to collect this money, and then found that the transaction was all bogus. An arrest warrant for the arrest of the parties was issued by Alderman Gedler yesterday, and this morning Detective Levy went to Corlies's house. While he was there Dolé entered, and the officers arrested both. The accused will have a hearing this afternoon at the Central Station.

FRONTIERS FROM JUSTICE.—Thomas Watson, James Chamberlain and John Bowman were arrested on Saturday afternoon, as they were leaving the ferryboat at Vine street wharf. It seems that on Friday night, a building at Waterford station, on the Camden and Atlantic Railroad, was broken into and robbed of a lot of pennies. These men were suspected and a telegraphic despatch requesting their arrest was sent to Lieutenant Rogers. When taken into custody a lot of pennies, a revolver and pistol, powder flask and some switch keys were found in their possession. They were identified by Mr. D. H. Mundy, the agent of the Camden and Atlantic Railroad Company, as the parties suspected, and will have a hearing this afternoon at the Central Station.

MURDEROUS ASSAULT BY A CHILD.—On Sunday afternoon Mrs. Zell, residing on Junico street, above Arch, went on an errand to a grocery store, leaving a child, seven months old, alone, playing on the floor of one of the rooms. She was absent but a short time, but while she was away, a little boy, three years of age, the son of a neighbor, entered the house. From some unknown cause he became enraged at the child, and taking a poker, made a savage attack on the little one. The child was beaten on the head and lost an eye. An arm was broken on the left side of the face, and he was horribly bruised. The injured infant is not expected to survive.

FINE ARTS.—Mr. Aaron Shaw, of this city, in anticipation of his departure for Europe, has concluded to offer for public competition his entire private collection of modern pictures, comprising works of art by the leading artists of the English, French, Flemish and American schools. Among them are two notices A. Van Hamme, E. Bosch, H. J. Baddington, deceased W. Spayer, Sr., Theodore Frère, P. L. Coutouy, William Hart, G. W. Nicholson, J. Inigo Williams, A. Toibé, Shattuck, Henrietta Rouner, W. M. F. de Haas, S. R. Gifford, and others. The paintings are now on exhibition at Scott's Art Gallery, Chestnut street, and will be sold on Thursday and Friday evenings of this week.

HELD TO ANSWER.—Wm. Regan, charged with leaving a mob named Scattergood at a ball at Odd Fellows' Hall, Tenth and South streets, on Saturday night, had a hearing before Alderman Swift this morning. Regan was quarrelling with a man named Smith, drew a pistol and which was discharged through the interference of other parties, and the ball wounded Scattergood, who had nothing to do with the affair. The injuries of Scattergood are not dangerous. Regan was held in one thousand dollars bail to answer at court.

SUSPICION OF LARCENY.—Eliza Boyle was arrested on Saturday, at Tenth and Shippen streets, on suspicion of having stolen a new basket filled with marketing. The basket and contents await an owner at the Seventeenth District Police Station. Eliza was committed by Alderman Bonser to the City Jail.

PISTOL SHOOTING, &c.—Three roughs named Geo. Riddle, Wm. McGowan and Samuel McLaughlin were arrested yesterday morning at three o'clock, at Sixteenth and South streets, for firing pistols in the street. On the way to the station house William McGowan drew a pistol and attempted to rescue the prisoners. He was then arrested. The prisoners had a hearing before Alderman Swift and were each held in \$100 bail for their appearance at court.

COMPLIMENTARY BENEFIT.—The numerous friends of Mr. Samuel McDougall have tendered him a complimentary benefit, which has taken place at Musical Fund Hall on Saturday evening next. An excellent programme has been prepared for the entertainment. For years past Mr. McDougall has been the doorman of the Academy of Music, Musical Fund Hall, and other places of amusement in the city. He deserves an overflowing house on this occasion.

POLICEMAN ASSAULTED.—Samuel Alderfer and Wm. Gillespie were arrested on Saturday night, upon the charge of having assaulted Policeman Smith, at Ninth and Chestnut streets. The officers were charged with striking and using force on the policeman. The accused were held in \$1,000 bail to answer at court.

JUVENILE SWARF THIEF.—A lad named James Dowdell, aged 17 years, was arrested this morning by Detective "Levy," at his home, at Garden and Callowhill streets, upon the charge of having sneaked into the house of C. A. Brown, No. 316 Marshall street, and carried off several articles of silver ware. The youth will have a hearing this afternoon at the Central Station.

MAN STABBED.—Benjamin Worthington was before Alderman Shoemaker this morning upon the charge of having stabbed George Roth. The two men quarrelled last night at a house on North Fourth street, near Columbia avenue. Worthington, it is alleged, drew a knife and cut Roth four times in the leg. He was held in \$1,500 bail to answer at court.

STEALING CARPET.—George Benneko and John Rink were before Alderman Fancost on the charge of the larceny of a roll of carpet from the carpet cleaning establishment, at Thirty-fifth and Race streets. They were arrested by Policeman McLaughlin, of the Ninth District, as they were leaving a pawn shop, after having pledged the stolen carpet. The accused were held in \$500 bail for trial.

NEW JERSEY MATTERS. FRAME BUILDINGS.—A large number of citizens in South Ward, Camden, have petitioned the Camden City Council to repeal the ordinance prohibiting the erection of frame buildings, so far as it applies to that portion of the city lying between the Camden and Atlantic Railroad, and between the Camden and Pine streets, and this measure, it is thought, will tend materially to increase the many improvements contemplated there.

OPENING STREETS.—Ralph Lee, George W. Carpenter, B. P. Slaty, James H. Stevens and C. J. Miles have been appointed commissioners to assess damages for opening Union avenue; Fourth street from Front street, to the Camden and Pine street; Linden street from Third to Fourth; Pearl street from Third to Fourth; Birch from Second to Fourth, and Elm from Second to Fourth streets.

EXTRA TAXES.—There are \$20,255 38 of the taxes on the warrants of 1892 for the three wards of Camden still uncollected. The special committee has been authorized to make these taxes within a specified time, at the expiration of which the amounts will be turned over to the City Collector, who will sell the properties, according to law, against which they are assessed.

SITE FOR A HALL.—It is now a well settled matter that Camden is to have a new City Hall. The building committee have been instructed to examine and decide upon the eligibility of a location, and also to ascertain the price for which a suitable site can be purchased.

STEALING MULES.—A man named James Carr has been committed to await a removal from the authorities of Cumberland county, on a charge of having stolen a pair of mules from a Mr. Hood, at Newport, Cumberland county. After securing them, he rode to Mianus, where he sold them for \$300, then made his way to Camden, where he was arrested and committed.

THE NEW JERSEY BOAT.—The new boat now being built by the West Jersey Ferry Company is to be constructed entirely of New Jersey iron and steel, and by Camden mechanics. It is rapidly advancing towards completion.

DEDICATING A STREET.—The West Jersey Ferry Company have dedicated George street to the city of Camden, at the expiration of which the street will be named after the Camden ferryman.

COLLECTOR ELECTED.—There being a vacancy in the office of Collector of South Ward, the City Council elected, at their last meeting, Mr. Wm. Wyatt to fill that vacancy.

PAVING.—The Ordinance Committee of Camden Council are preparing an ordinance providing for the paving of State street from Water to Front street, in North Ward.
