COMBINED FIRE LADDER AND HOSE CARRIAGE. -There is now on exhibition at the office of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, a model of a combined fire ladder and hose carriage, which has recently been invented. The new apparatus is to be so constructed as to be easily and rapidly transported from place to place, to be very compact, and the ladders at the same time to be capable of as great extension as may be necessary, or as is compatible with the strength of the material. The carriage is constructed with four wheels, mounted on a suitable frame and supporting two segmental racks. These racks attached at one end to a number of ladders and braces, so fastened together as to form a series of knee-levers placed in opposition to each other, and raised from a horizontal position to one more or less angular, by the segmental racks, and a mechanism consisting of several wheels to give motion to the racks. On each side is attached a hose reel, from which a line is run on each side of the ladders in such a manner that when the ladders are being raised two lines of hose are also raised with them.
