CITY COUNCIL.—Last evening the Council of Camden met at the City Hall. The following principal items of business were disposed of: A resolution was parsed authorizing the City Treasurer to refund 40 per cent to parties who had paid their culvert assessment, and also fixing the rate of tax hereafter on such bills at 31 50 instead of \$2 50 per 1,000 square feet. The Surveyor was instructed to make out a new statement in accordance with the above rates. Another resolution was passed suthorizing the Street Committee of Middle Ward to pave that portion of the gutters remaining unpayed on Henry effect, between Berkley and Morris streets.

The quarterly appropriations to the different Fire Companies were approved and ordered to be paid.

A polition was also presented asking Connell to change the name of Plum streett to that of Arch. Referred to the Committee on Streets. After disposing of some other minor items, Council adjourned.
