The officers of milway companies profess their willingness to milway companies of conductors, if they could be assured of securing good, reliable, honest men; but until some plan be devised and put in successful operation, enabling the conductors to prove to the antisfaction of employers the correctness of the accounts, the honest conductors necessarily must suffer for the shortcomings of those who do not hesitate to take advantage of the trust confided in them while many Conductors on the various Rai s are as honorable men as others filling p dons of trust in the higher walks of filling p.

ous tan dilling produced to the higher walks of life, it unfortunately happens that where so large a number of men are employed, some will take advantage of every opportunity to commit fraud and peculation, which would still be the case if their salaries were doubled. Under such circumstances, if a plan should be devised for the cellection of fares, which would prevent the peculation known to be daily occurring, it would prove a great blessing to the knoest Conductor, and an advantage to the Public and the Railway Companies. It would prevent the community and an advantage to the Public and the Railway Companies. It would prevent the community looking upon the Conductor as being dishonesty of some in such positions; it would enable the Companies to liberally compensate him for his long and arduous labors, and to retain him in their employ so long as he desired, without the dread suspense of a summary dismissal (which course prevails to a certain extent to prevent or care such depredations.) A plan looking to this much desired reform is about being tested on one of our principal Railways, not precisely as its President would desire to put it in operation, and would do, but for reasons which at present he cannot overcome—yet in a manner which will undoubtedly prove successful if supported by the public, whose interest in doing so we have shown.

The new plan will be introduced on the Yest Philadelphia Railway, (Market street.) on Monday next. Each Conductor will be provided with a small metallic box, containing a roll of Checks, counting from No. 1 upwards, and upon collecting a fare in money or ticket, the passenger will receive from the Conductor one of the said Checks, which will be a receipt for the fare, and will contain the date of issue, and the number of the Conductor. If kept, it will enable the Passenger to identify a car, should any article be left in the same, or the conductor or driver, should any misconduct on their part warrant the passenger reporting them to the officers of the Company. To make this plan effective, it will be necessary for each passenger to receive the check, and to claim it should the conductor omit giving it, as the accounts between them and the Company will be governed by the number of checks remaining in each box at the time of settlement.
