The wounded man, exclaiming, "My G-d, I'm shot!" fell to the floor, and from there crawled on to a bed that was in the room. In the meanwhile his two partners had rushed toward the man Cooper, who still held the revolver in his on to a bod that was in the room. In the mean while his two partners had rushed toward the man Cooper, who still held the revolver in his hand, and with their batons they knocked him incensible to the floor. Even then they were not satisfied, but continued to strike him about the head and face until his head presented a most taken to the police station, where his wounds were attended to. The doctor says that he is dangerously injured, and that in all probability he will never recover.

Mr. Dries, the individual who was shot, was attended by Dr. Corptaint, and Storely who

tended by Drs. Constant and Storck, who promptly dressed the wound, and made the unfortunate man as comfortable as possible. They express themselves as hopeful that he will survive the wound, but they cannot say positively that he will recover. danger.

The man Cooper is employed as a porter in a house on South Water street, and is a brother-in-law of the man he attempted to murder. He was all day Tuesday last looking for Mr. Dries, and informed several people that he intended to "fax him." He claims that Dries has made trouble between himself and wife, from whom he has been separated for some time past, and among other things, claiming that he wished his wife to buy some lots in the North Division, but that Dries "interfered and prevented her from doing so. He also claims that he did but dollow the teachings of the Bible in shooting the man, for he says: "Does not that good book tell us to kill him who would make trouble, or breed dissensions in a man's family?"
