At the time the bloody attack was made a pistol shot was fired, and it was supposed that the ball had entered Gallen's body, as he was noticed to throw up his hands as if in great agony. He was carried to the Pennsylvania Hospital, where he died in about twenty minutes after his admittance. The stabbing occurred between 6 and 7 o'clock. The deceased was stationed at the window of the election poll, challenging voters. It is said that he had a club in his hands, which he threatened to use on the head of any one who doubted his right to be there. A person who came up to vote had some words with him, and this resulted in the knockdown and stabbing. The deceased was a single man, and was about twenty-three years old. He resided with his parents on Hall street, above Ninth. His wounds were three in number—two in the right and one in the left breast, the latter Ninth. in the right and one in the left breast, the latter penetrating the lung.

During the night the Seventeenth District Police arrested Dennis McBride, John Tague, Thomas Holland, Michael McBride, Joseph Gravland and Geo. Faulkner upon the charge of having been concerned in the affair. Michael McBride, who is alleged to have done the stabbing, claims that Gallen beat him with a base ball club. Gravland is alleged to have fired the pistol. The prisoners were all locked up in the Central Station, to await the result of the Corporal investigation.
