The market for government securities has not been materially affected by the resolution passed by the House of Representatives yesterday calling upon the Commistee of Ways and Means to draw up a bill taxing the intervet on United States stocks, as the latter is regarded as nerely intended for political effect, and even those who woted for the resolution would probably not vote for the bill they have asked for. Such a measure is one of repudication and in direct autagonism to the resolutions adopted in the Republican Convention at Chicago. In order to show the feeling with which the measure is regarded by the leading banking houses in Wall street we quote the following from the private circular of one of their number issued this eventual.

The action of the House yesterday upon the resolution proposing a ten per cent tax upon the interest of government bonds has created a feeling of distrust in the market which, without any large sacrifices of bonds, has made lower prices.
