

CITY BULLETIN.

CAMPAIN CLUB OF 1868.—A meeting to perfect the organization of this Club, and to prepare for the campaign, will be held this evening, at the City Armory, Broad street, below Race. This Club performed excellent service for Lincoln and Hamlin in 1860, and will work as efficiently for Grant and Colfax during the present campaign. Col. Wm. B. Mann is the President and Chief Marshal. The Club is already a large one, but at the meeting this evening the number of members will no doubt, be greatly swelled.

MURDEROUS ASSAULT UPON A WIFE.—James Dougherty, residing at Front and Mifflin streets, is in the habit of getting drunk, and when in that condition, it is alleged, he abuses his wife in a shameful manner. Yesterday, while under the influence of liquor, he quarreled with his wife and beat her badly. He then cut her with a knife, seriously injuring her. Mrs. Dougherty was conveyed to the Hospital. The brutal husband was arrested, and, after a hearing before Ald. Titterton, was sent to prison.

ILLEGAL WHISKY.—A man named John McGittigan, residing at No. 504 Mullen street, was driving a wagon at a furious rate along Germantown avenue, in the neighborhood of Seventh street, this morning, and was arrested by a policeman. Upon the arrival of the prisoner and wagon at the Station-house, two barrels of whisky were found in the vehicle. McGittigan was committed by Alderman Hood for fast driving, and his connection with the whisky will be investigated by the United States officials.

ELECTION OF A PRESIDENT.—The Trustees of Dickinson College, at their adjourned meeting in this city on Tuesday, 8th inst., unanimously elected Rev. R. L. Dashiell, D. D., of the Newark Conference, to the Presidency of that Institution. Dr. Dashiell is a graduate of the College, and is thought he will accept and enter on the duties immediately.

ROBBING HIS EMPLOYER.—William Harris, who was employed in a brick-yard at Forty-third street and Kingsessing avenue, was arrested yesterday for the larceny of money from a pocket in the coat of his employer. He was taken before Alderman Lunger, and was held in \$500 bail to answer.

FIRE-PROOF SAFE BLOWN OPEN.—The soap manufactory of Grady & Keefe, on Fourth street above Lombard, was entered a few nights ago by breaking in on the back door with an axe. A fire-proof safe was blown open, and the thieves got nothing for their trouble.

RUN OVER A CHILD.—Accidental Anderson, the driver of a milk-wagon, was arrested yesterday at Fifth and Race streets on the charge of having driven his horse and wagon over a little girl six years of age. He was held for a further hearing by Alderman Williams. Day Sergeant Adam Reese made the arrest.

SUPPOSED LARCENY.—Early this morning a man who gave his name as William Huttlinger was overhauled at Front and Vine streets. He had in his possession a large box of pepper, which is supposed to have been stolen from some spice manufactory. The prisoner was committed by Ald. Toland.

DEATH OF A POLICEMAN.—James W. Benckert, a member of the Reserve Corps of Police, died last evening at his residence, No. 620 Fisher street, of jaundice. Mr. Benckert had been connected with the Reserve Corps since it was established, and was a faithful officer.

BEAT HIS WIFE.—R. H. Edwards, residing at No. 2118 Carleton street was arrested yesterday and taken before Alderman Hancock upon the charge of assault and battery on his wife. He was held in \$500 bail for trial.

ACCIDENT.—A colored man named Simon Hill, the driver of a cart loaded with boards, fell off at Tenth and Race streets, this morning, about nine o'clock, and the wheels passed over his left foot, crushing it badly.

MARKET THIEVES.—James Burns and Charles Dougherty were arrested this morning for the larceny of potatoes from South Street Market. They were committed by Alderman Titterton.

Or with the Apollo Belvedere at Rome, Or gaze upon the Medicæan Stone, Or at the columns of the Parthenon, And see no beauty, and feel no repose— Or at St. Peter's dome turn up your nose— You're just the man to find yourself uneasy At the 'Hotel Dell' Usarco' at Pisa."

Successful experiments, it is reported, have recently been made at Kingsburg, Prussia, with a new firearm having 37 barrels.
