Mexico, Aug. 29.—The best news of the hour is that with the rout of the insurgent bands of the Sicira, the campaign in that quarter is virtually at and. So the last, of the more considerable class of troubles which the Government has encountered in the field appears to be quieted. Otherwise, the cituation is unedlifying. A noted bandit-hunter named Bocardo has beaten the small bands of proneunced thieves which were annoying the upper part of the State of Vera Cruz; and one Munoz, of Campeche, possibly another political thief, has been summarily whipped, and how proposes to serve the Government of Yucatan, which Heaven savel another conspirator against that State has been shot. The State of Michoscan has dictated a penalty of ten years' imprisonment against the ecommon class of robbers; has relieved of imposts the agricultural trade of the poor, and has made a special tax for the institution of a penitentiary—three things which seem very well to agree. A notorious highwayman called the Ox has been brought to slaughter in Jalisco; and the town of Huachinango rose up not long ago and drove off a band of robbers, probably the same who are now plaguing the little State of Tlascala, body and soul. It is shameful, though not surprising, that one of the silver haciendas of Pachuca has just been robbed of \$5,000, boldly and coolly taken out of the capellina or receptacle wherein the metal is cooked, whether by wandering theves in broad day, or by laborers, or ladrones of the town is not certain. Of any indubitable State of misery, Pachuca may be set down as the capital, and the news which reaches us that kidnapping and plundering is common in that quarter, is by no means a sensation. This district is legended with crime, and is about the most villations in all Mexico. Hearing that a bandit of the Pachuca class had lately robbed a mail from Mexico, is it not shocking to learn that the mails from all merico were lately detained and violated by order of the Governor of Guerrero. The New Governor of Canada.

In our cable despatches yesterday it was announced that Sir John Young, Bart., present Governor-General of New South Wales and extonian Commissioner, had been named for Governor-General of Canada.

Sir John Young is the eldest son and heir of the late Sir William Young, of Baileborough Castle, in the county of Cavan, Ireland. His father was a prominent member of the East India Company in days past. Retiring with a fortune, Sir William offered himself as candidate for the representation of Cavan in Parliament, but was defeated, his political opinions not agreeing exactly with those of the Earl of Farnham, who possessed, through his numerous tenantry, the chief interest at the elections in that district. After a few years Mr. John Young, the newly apthe chief interest at the elections in that district. After a few years Mr. John Young, the newly appointed ruler of Canada, then a young man, presented himself as a candidate to the voters of Cavan and was returned to represent them in the House of Commons in conjunction with Mr. Henry Maxwell, who succeeded to the Farnham peerage, and has just lost his life by the melancholy disaster by fire in the Iriah mail train travelling through Weles for London. Mr. Young—now Sir John Young, after the decease of his father—soon obtained the notice of Parliament both by his diligent attention to his duties and his sound practical knowledge on all matters relating to Ireland. The late Sir Robert Peel at once noticed his availability for public life, and, with Mr. Young's consent, ranked him with his party of moderate conservatives, anxious to do his party of moderate conservatives, anxious to do justice to Ireland without a repeal of the legisla-tive union. Under Peel's Premierahip Sir John Young held the office of Joint Secretary of the Young field the office of John Secretary of the Treasury of England, in which he distinguished himself by his application to business, his judi-cious use of the official patronage confided to him, and his freedom from religious and politi-

cal prejudices.
Sir John comes of an old Scotch family.having Sir John comes of an old Scotch family, having its origin with John Young, a "burgess of Edinburg" in the year 1541. The Governor of Canada was born on the 31st of August, 1807, and married April 8, 1835, Adelaide Annabella, daughter of the late Marchioness of Headfort, by her first busband, Edward Tuite Dalton. His family is thus intimately connected with the Countess of Cavan, Meath and Westmeath, in Ireland. During the years immediately past Sir John Young has ruled the colony of New South Wales in a very successful manner in the name of Queen Victoria, and is likely from his habits, discrimination, caution and experience, but particularly from his accurate appreciation of the Irish character, to prove equally useful to the English crown in Canada.
