ROBBERY BY MASKED MEN.—This morning, about one o'clock, three men entered the house of Mr. O'Connell, which is located a short distance from the old Lancaster turnpike, about five miles from Market street bridge. The entrance was effected through the kitchen door which is supposed to have been entered by means of nippers. The burglars were masked, and they proceeded to the sleeping apartment of Mr. O'Connell. He was aroused, but the rascals seized him by the throat and almost choked him. Mr. O'Connell had been ill for some time, and was in a weak condition. He told the rascals that he was unable to resist them. They then proceeded to rob him, and he was taken to the Sixth District Police Station, and Lieut. Tolbert sent men out in all directions but no traces of the thieves could be obtained.

WOODEN WEDDING.—The fifth anniversary of the marriage of Rev. T. DeWitt Talnage was celebrated last evening at his residence, on Eighth street, above Brown, which was visited by many members of his congregation, nearly all of whom took with them articles of various kinds. At a late hour in the evening the dining-room presented a peculiar appearance, there being piled up wooden ware in large abundance, comprising tubs, buckets, flour sifter, a clothes-horse, wooden bowls, large and small, clothes-pins, pie boards, mince meat boards, and choppers; a large hot-bed, extending almost the entire length of the room, toys for the little ones, and other articles of wooden manufacture too numerous to mention. Some of the wooden dishes contained vegetables and articles of pie. Speeches were made during the evening by the Pastor, and Messrs. Moore, Supple, Vantine, Nichols, McCarty, and others.

Fox was taken before Alderman Beiler, and was committed by the Alderman in default of \$1,000 bail.

RATINGS ON GUINNESS.—It is contrary to an act of Assembly to shoot birds, and recently the Fifteenth District Police have been making raids upon gunners who have been operating in the neighborhood of Frankford. Several have been arrested and had the penalty of \$25 imposed upon them.

DROWNED.—James Johnson, residing in Brooklyn, L. I., fell from the brig Catawba, lying at Port Richmond yesterday, and was drowned. The body was recovered, and the Coroner held an inquest.

ATTEMPT TO STEAL A BOAT.—Harbor Policeman Gibson last evening arrested, at Delaware avenue and Lombard street, a negro named Joseph Green, upon the charge of attempting to steal a boat. Green had a hearing before Alderman Toland, and was sent to prison.

LATENCY OF CLOTH.—John Ransom was arrested at Second and Dock streets, last evening, by Harbor Policeman Grimes, on the charge of the latency of a roll of cloth from a store at Second and Poplar streets. Alderman Toland committed the accused.

Sealed Proposals will be received at the Office of the Chief Commissioner of Highways until 12 o'clock, P. M., on ON MONDAY, OCTOBER 23, 1868, for the construction of the following:

Three-foot Sewers, viz. on Seventh street from Market street to Arch street, Marks street from Eleventh street to 63rd street, and Twelfth street, Sixth street from Green street to Coates street, Saratoga street from Girard street to Poplar street, Woodstock street from Berks street to Norris street, Montgomery street from Broad street to Twelfth street.

Two feet six inch Sewers, viz. on Eleventh street, from 95 foot north of Jefferson, to 30 foot north of Reeves street, from Twelfth to Twenty-first street.

Thirteenth street, from 253 foot north of Jefferson, to 268 foot north of Oxford street. Moyer and Dauphin streets, between Norris street and Belgrade street. With such iron and stone inlets and man holes as may be directed by the Chief Engineer and Surveyor. The understanding to be that the Sewers hereto advertised are to be completed on or before the 31st day of Dec., 1868, and the Contractor shall take full prepared against the property fronting on said sewer to the amount of one dollar and twenty cents for each lineal foot of sewer on each side of the street as much cash paid; the balance, as limited by Ordinance, to be paid by the city, and the Contractor will be required to keep the street and sewer in good order for three years after the sewer is finished.

When the street is occupied by a City Passenger Railroad track, the Sewer shall be constructed along side of said track in such manner as not to obstruct or interfere with the safe passage of the cars thereon; and no claim for remuneration shall be paid the Contractor by the company, using said track, as specified in Act of Assembly passed May 28th, 1866.

All Bidders are invited to be present at the time and place of opening the said Proposals. Each proposal will be accompanied by a certificate that a Bond has been filed in the Law Department as directed by Ordinance of May 25th, 1866. If the Lowest Bidder shall not execute a contract within five days after the work is awarded, he will be deemed as declining, and will be held liable on his bond for the difference between his bid and the next highest bid.
