MURDER IN THE THIRD WARD. A Woman Choucd to Death by Her Husband.

Mrs. Mary Walmsley, aged 38 years, residing at No. 2 Gaffney's avenue, running south from Fitzwater, between Sixth and Seventh streets, was water, between Sixth and Seventh streets, was choked to death by her husband. hands got pretty drunk, and a continuous quar-rel was kept up during almost the entire night. As fighting is no unusual circumstance in that locality neither the visitors or the other occu-pants of the house paid any attention to the

pants of the house paid any attention to the noise.

This morning, about 5 o'clock, the quarrel between Walmsley and his wife was renewed. She had placed in her bosom \$11 given to her last night, and Walmsley endeavored to take it from her. She resisted and a struggle ensued. He seized her by the throat and held her until she became black in the face. He also struck her in the face and kicked her. The mother of Mrs. Walmsley interfered on behalf of her daughter and was also kicked. It was then found that Mrs. Walmsley, who had fallen to the floor, was dead, and Walmsley ided before an alarm could be given.

The police were soon notified of the occurrence and earch was made for the murderer, without avail. He was traced to several taverns in the neighborhood, but he could not be found by the officers. He is a tall man, about forty years of officers. He is a tall man, about forty years of age, with sandy hair and goatee, and wears a long, light overcoat with ear flaps.
