PHILADELPHIA CATTLE MARKET, November 5.—Beef cattle were in fair demand this week, but prices were unsettled and rather lower. About 1,800 head arrived and sold at 86c to 90c cents for extra Pennsylvania and Western steers, 75c to 77c cents for fair to good do., and 46c to 48c cents per pound gross for common as to quality. gers, we gather the following particulars of the late disaster on the Union Pacific, which resulted in the death of one man (the fireman) and the demolition of a part of the train. On Monday during last Friday night, two trains and a car to which they were spiked, were taken out between Ogallala and Big Springs. The rails are connected by craps of iron on each side and bolted so that all that is necessary is a wrench, to fit the bolt, for their removal. Saturday morning the western bound freight train was thrown from the track, the engine and a number of cars being totally wrecked and the fireman killed. An engine was dispatched from North Platte to the relief of the passenger train. Upon approaching the scene of disaster obstructions were found placed on the track, and shortly after Indians were discovered attempting to cut off the engine, which at that time was retreating to the next switch. The Indians were identified as Ogallala Sioux. The state of affairs being known, troops and other assistance were sent forward from North Platte, Sedwick and Russell. The track was repaired and a bridge near Big Springs built, and the train due at Cheyenne on Saturday evening arrived there on Monday morning at 10 o'clock.
