

CITY BULLETIN.

FRANKLIN INSTITUTE.—Professor Morton's second lecture on Light was delivered last evening with entire success, to an audience that, notwithstanding the bad weather, was packed to the exclusion of later arrivals some time before the hour of commencement. Decidedly the feature of the experimental illustration was the new illuminated fountain of a hundred water jets.

A HEAVY GALE.—A northeast storm set in last evening, and during the night the rain came down pretty lively. The wind was high, and between two and three o'clock this morning blew a perfect gale along the coast, and many of the trees were overthrown, but no serious damage was done.

A DOUBLE ARREST.—John G. Tront, the driver of an express wagon. Yesterday afternoon his wagon got too close to another vehicle at Ninth and Arch streets. John W. Gibbs struck his horse with an umbrella, and then got out of his wagon and assaulted Gibbs. He was arrested and held in \$800 bail by Alderman Jones. Gibbs was charged with cruelty to animals, and was likewise held to bail.

A BOGUS CHECK.—James Barrett was arrested yesterday and was taken before Alderman Randall upon the charge of obtaining money under false pretences. It is alleged that he went to Mr. William McCulloch, Treasurer of the West Chester and Philadelphia Railroad Company, and got the money for a check for \$50. When the check was presented at the bank it was found that Barrett had no account there. He was held for trial.

LARCENY OF CLOTHING.—Cassius Klatt was before Alderman Jones, yesterday, upon the charge of the larceny of clothing, valued at \$100, the property of Geo. C. G. The defendant had a bunch of stolen boys and some other articles were found on his person. He has been in the custody of the police before on charge of larceny. He was held in \$800 bail to answer at court.

STEALING WASHED CLOTHING.—James O'Brien was arrested this morning at Broad and Ellsworth streets. He had in his possession a lot of washed clothing, which he said he had stolen at Sixty-fifth street and Lancaster avenue. The clothing are at the Seventeenth District Police Station. O'Brien was sent to prison by Ald. Bonnell.

LARCENY OF TOOLS.—George Smith was arrested last evening at Tenth and Master streets for the larceny of shovels and picks from the brickyard of James Gill, in that vicinity. He was pursued and captured by Mr. Gill. The shovels were taken before Alderman Kemble and was committed to answer.

SAILED.—The steamship Junista, of the Philadelphia and Southern Mail Steamship Company's line, left Quenn street wharf at 8 o'clock this morning, taking out a full freight and an aggregate of about sixty cabin passengers, the names of which will be found under the proper heading.

FOND OF GOOD LIVING.—Edward Emery went into Eaton's restaurant, on Dock street, below Third, yesterday, and when he went away, he took without permission four pairs of ducks valued at \$150. He was arrested. Ald. Jones had him in \$300 bail to answer at court.

HEAVY ROBBERY.—The drygoods store of M. A. Pollock, on Eighth street, above Race, was forced open sometime during last night. The thieves made a selection of some of the most valuable goods. The loss is estimated at \$1,000.

HOUSE ROBBERY.—The residence of Mr. John A. Haddock, No. 1209 Thompson street, was entered at an early hour this morning, and was robbed of a lot of silver spoons and napkin-rings.

FLUID LAMP EXPLOSION.—This morning, about three o'clock, a fluid lamp exploded in a watch-box, at the junction of the Reading Railroad and Richmond street. The building was set on fire and partly destroyed.

TAILOR STORE ROBBERY.—The tailor store of P. Welck & Bros., No. 236 South Fourth street, was broken into at an early hour this morning, and goods valued at \$400 were carried off.

NEW ORGAN.—To-morrow evening, the new organ built by Messrs. Hook & Co., of Boston, for the Olivet Presbyterian Church, Twenty-second and Mount Vernon streets, will be opened. Several well-known organists will perform, and there will be vocal music by accomplished amateurs. The following is a description of the instrument:

GRAND MANTEL—Bourdon, 16 feet, wood, 46 pipes; open diapason, 8 feet, metal, 65 pipes; dulciana, 8 feet, metal, 46 pipes; stopped diapason bass, 8 feet, wood, 28 pipes; Metodia, 8 feet, wood, 58 pipes; octave, 4 feet, metal, 58 pipes; Fifteenth, 2 feet, metal, 58 pipes; Mixture, 2 ranks, metal, 116 pipes. SWELL MANTEL—Keraulophon, 8 feet, metal, 46 pipes; stopped diapason bass, 8 feet, wood, 58 pipes; stopped diapason treble, 8 feet, wood, 58 pipes; harmonique, 4 feet, metal, 65 pipes; violina, 4 feet, metal, 65 pipes; oboe, 8 feet, metal, 38 pipes; bassoon, 8 feet, metal, 38 pipes; trombone, 8 feet, metal, 38 pipes. Pedals—Sub-bass (bound), 16 feet, tone, wood 27 pipes; Flute, 5 feet, wood, 27 pipes.

Mechanical Requisites—Swell to great; great to pedal; swell to pedal; bellows signal. The "Pedals" has a compass adequate to the performance of all music written for the organ, and has two stops: the "Bourdon 16 feet," of large scale, voiced by our new method, giving in place of hard, "breaking" tone, so often heard in the larger "stopped" pipes, a full, deep, pervading bass, which for metal choir accompaniment is preferable to the ordinary "Open Diapason 16 feet."

There are two pedals for arranging combinations of stops for the Great Manual, thus giving the player control of the registers without moving his hands from the key-boards.
