The rafters were all in their place, were guyed and perlines between them. He considered them all safe and could give no account

of the accident.

John B. Anderson testified that he considered the accident unavoidable, and could not tell the cause of it; the accident was unavoidable in his

Judgment.
Wm. McClain sworn—When the last rafter was put up he was standing by the derrick; the rope he had hold of was then slacked, but it was still on the rafter; he could not give the cause of the

on the rainer he come not give the cause of the necident; the eastern guy rope was broken.

David Cramer testified that he had the general charge of the job; was at the building a few moments before the accident, when everything appeared to be; working right. He then left and went to attend to some business. What caused the breaking of the guy be could not tell; he could tell the cause of the falling. If there had been no strain or pressure from some cause the

been no strain or pressure from some cause the accident would not have occurred.
