The list contains 20,500 names. The preportion of names known is less than one-half, or about twenty-livé percent less than that which generally holds good throughout the country, which is thought to be about two-thirds known and one-third unknown. This volume of the Boll of Honor increases the number of graves now recorded in printed form to about 155,000. Of the occupants of these graves, the names of about 100,000 appear as known, leaving about 55,000 as yet unknown. Many of these unknown remains were doubtless marked by their friends or comrades at the time of their burial, and the record of the names of many others were doubtless made at the time of their burial, and the record of the names of many bave been preserved in connection with other plans or schedules of the position of the graves by the immediate friends of the dead, the officers in command of the burial squads, or the surgeons in charge of the field hospitals.
