

THE CIVIL SERVICE. If there is the least hope of the adoption of Mr. Jenckes's plan of reforming the civil service, one of the most important preliminary measures is to start with good men in office. There must not only be a thorough purging of offices now filled, but an honest determination to fill vacant ones with men who deserve them. That this determination has aot, as yet, taken practical shape in the minds of those who have to do with the appointments, is painfully evident. Some of the most important positions in the civil service are being filled with persons who are iterly destitute of any single claim to or iness for them, and the Republican party at large looks on with unmistakable disgust, as it sees men who have done nothing for, and deserved nothing from, the Republican party, pushed into places of great responsibility and great capability of emolument, while scores. of better men, who have given time and

When Andrew Johnson makes a bad appointment all men expect it, and are neither shocked nor surprised. But when Republican Senators and Copgressmen approve and endorse such appointments, there is a deep reeling indignant disappointment among the people, whose hearts are set upon seeing the civil service administered by faithful, honest, bonorable and deserving men. Why the people should be refused such a demand as this, it is very hard to explain. There are hidden springs of action, and secret combinations of infigure, and barkains and promises and intrigues of which the public see and know nothing, but which produce results which bring nothing but disgrace upon the great Republican party. Such influences as these are always at work, and they gain much of their power for mischief from the tacit acquiescence of a timorous press. It is quite within the power of the Republican press of the country, or of any large community, 10 break down these secret combinations by which high office is con terred upon unworthy and unsafe men, and by which the affront of notoriously bid appointments is put upon a party which is, in itself, patrictic and pure. Time is not only edax rerum,--the devourer of things, but it is amendator rerum,-the rectifier of things, and there is within the mass of the American people a purifying element that will slough off from the body-politic che things which cling like fungi and parasites to it, and bring about those "good times" when it will be impossible to secure such appointments by the Executive or such confirmations by the Senate as now too often disgrace the Republican name. When that time comes, and it is not far off. every man will be judged by the record which he is now making. Congress is always a hule behind the people. The tidal waves of popular sentiment break last of all upon Capitol Hill; but they never spend their figal force until they make themselves felt upon whoever among the servants, of the people have proved unfaithful to their sacred trust.

THE UNION LEAGUE. The annual meeting of the Union League was held last night. The annual report was presented by the Secretary, George H. Boker, Esq., showing a gratifying condition of the affairs of this noble institution. It closes the year with the handsome balance of \$15,879 78 in its treasury, while its membership keeps up to nearly 1,800, of the most energetic and public spirited men of Philadelphia. The exbibit of the work of the Publication Committee will amaze those who are not acquainled with this the most powerful agency of the Union League. For years past this Publication Committee has been silently educating the people of Pennsylvania in the doctrines of true Republicanism, and, since the last annual report, it has scattered over the State nearly a million and a half of documents; and this, not with prodigal indiscrimination, but with a systematic reference to the dis tricts and even the individuals most in need of enlightenment. The retiring chairman of this committee, Lindley Smytu, Esq., has done a work of which even the members of the League have, as a body, a very faint con-

| ception, and his retirement from a post to which he has devoted such remarkable enerergies and abilities is a source of great regret. The Presidency of the Union League changes with this annual election. J. Gilingham Fell, Esq., who has presided over the League for the last three or four years with such peculiar acceptance, withdraws in consequence of a prolonged absence in Europe, whither he has gone in search of health. By a singular oversight the report makes no eference to the continued and valuable ser vices of the retiring President, but there is no difference of opinion as to the rare wisdom moderation, tact and patriotic energy with which he has administered its affairs. Mr. Fell is succeeded by Horace Binney, Jr., Esq., whose name alone will be a tower of new strength to the management of the League. We congratulate this patriotic body upon their past successes and good services, and wish them all prosperity in their comin years.

The news of the peaceable termination the insurrection in Cadiz will disappoint the friends and the enemies of Spanish liberty. The latter hoped that this uprising would be the beginning of a general fratricidal war; the former seriously feared such a result, and could perceive in the possibility, nothing but ruin and disaster to the brave people who have broken the thrall of Bourbon tyranny. Opinion differs as to the source from whence the insurgents derived their inspiration. It is asserted by some that the partisans of Isabella instigated the outbreak, and l others, that the Carlists were at the bottom of it. Probably neither the one or the othe had anything to do with it. From the facts published, it is evident that it was merely the result of Republican impatience with the delay of the Provisional government in organizing a permanent government, aggravated perhaps by suspicion of the designs of the monarchists, and a fear that the choice of a ruler would not be left to the people. It may be that there was no ground for any such suspicions, but time alone will prove whether the revolutionists were right or wrong. The friends of Spain will rejoice that the insurregtion is at an end, and they will wait with anxious expectation the meeting of the Cories, and the final settlement of the question of the form of permanent government.


