This makes affairs extremely dull here. No committees of either House are in accalon, except a few members of the House Committee on Appropria-

tions, who meet informally nearly every and amuse themselves day, by mercilessly cutting down the list of mercilessly cutting down the list of appropriations for the coming fiscal year, asked for by the heads of departments. Just now the watchword is "Retrenciment," and this principla-will be inexorably curied out under the adminis-tration of General Grant, because it is generally conceded that Representative Washburne, of Hinois, will be one of Grant's most trusted ad-visers, and Washburne's "eccentricities" in the way of cutting down expenses are, well known to everybody connected with the Depart-ments here. Wherever he thinks a sixpence can be saved to the Government, he is the man to stop the leak, and when once he scents his game there's no use trying to stop him or persuade him that the expenses is necessary and legitimate. He "lops" all such excressences from the approhim that the expense is necessary and regulmate. He "lops" all such excreasences from the appro-priation bills with as little computcion, asl f he were disputing a bill which would have to be paid out of his own pocket. Therefore there is some talk that, after all that has been said about his going into the Cabinet, he will prefer to keep his going into the Cabinet, he will be more inc his seat in the House, where he will be more in-dependent than as a cabinet minister, and can follow the bent of his economical proclivities to his heart's content. He could do more service in his present position to General Grant's administration than in any other, although it seems to be settled that he can have a seat in the Cabinet if he desires it.

THE INDIAN TROUBLES.

FARINAULT, MININ, Dec. 5, 1868.-My Dear Friend:--I did not think it would be necessary to write to you so soon again on behalf of the poor Indiases. I beg you, as you pity God's poor killed creatures, to ask the Executive Committee of your Indian Commission to employ some connecting approximation to investigate the so competent fearless person to investigate the re-cent events connected with our Indian war. I have not the proof, or I would appeal over my Lave not the proof, or I would appeal over my own signature to the people of America, to stop this system of isiquity. You cannot cure by wrong; you caunot stone for robbery by murder. It is my firm belief that every provision of the treaty made with the In-dians by the Peace Commission was violated and they left to destifution last spring; and that, by fallare of Congress to make early appropriations, they were compelled to leave their reservation and go to the Buffalo ranges to eacape death. Second—That our refusal to give them either food, or the means (arms, &c.) to kill game, was regarded as a violation of the treaty. Third—That as early as Augustor September officers of the United Statesso far forgot every principle of humanity and fear of God, as to usive an order that ne mercy should be shown to women and children, and that expeditions should

women and children, and that expeditions should be flitted out to strike a blow on the families of Indiane.

Indiana: Fourth.-That it will be found that at least a portion of the Indians killed recently, Black Ket-lie and his party, were friendly Indians. Fifth.-That even if there had been reveral acts of hostility committed by individual Indians of peaceable bands, and by hostile bands, this shame-less disregard of justice has been the most fool-hardy course we could have pursued. An Incident of the Earthquake in Chile. The Panama Stor has the following: "On the evening of the 10th ultimo, died in Valparaiso, Mrs. Davidson, one of the sufferers by the terrible earthquake of the 13th of August. She was a widow, and was living at Arica with her son when this catastrophe occurred, he find-ing her after the first heavy shock partially buried under the ruins of their house. With some assis-tance she was got out, but so badly bruised that she could not sit up. While they sought further help she was carried away by the sea, which began to invade the town a few minutes before six o'clock; she, however, had managed to get began to invade the town at lew minutes before six o'clock; she, however, had managed to get her arms through a broken door, and that kept her afloat. She was washed on to a small island hard, by; but the waters left her there only fifteen minutes. A boat was despatched there only fifteen minutes. A boat was despatched to her rescue by the Peruvian corvette America; it was half full of water by the time it picked her up, and she had been in the sea eight hours and three-quarters. The turbulent state of the waters bailed all efforts to return to the ship, so the men put their boat out to sea to wait till day-light, and reached the shore at about six o'clock on the following morning. For three days she lay exposed to the scorching rays of the sua and the cold night dews, without any other shelter than that afforded by a common blanket that her than that afforded by a common blanket that her son was able to get. After an unavailing effort to get to Valparaiso by the mail steamer, she reached here by the Esmeralda on the 27th of September. Every care was taken of the unfor-tunate lady, but the shock and attendant suffering had been too severe for her to bear."
