

# LETTER FROM PARIS.

[Correspondence of the Phils, Evening Bulletin, ] Demonstration at the Funeral of M. Berryer-Its Political Significance-The Attitude of the People shown-Distinguished Politicians Present. PARIS, Dec. 8, 1868 .- The funeral of M. Berryer, which took place yesterday at the village church at Angerville, was quite as important a demonstration as I expected would be the case both in a political and moral point of view. As I had witnessed the aspect of the popular assemblage on the 3d inst., in order to report to you the bearing and attitude of the "people" toward the government, so, in like manner, I thought it desirable to see and hear the looks and language of the large number of the higher and intellectual classes who were expected to manifest their sympathy and respect for the deceased legitimist statesman. Accordingly, I proceeded to the Lyons railway station at the appointed hour for the special train, which was to start in time for the funeral ceremony. I was prepared, from what I had heard, to see a good deal, but certainly nothing to the extent of what I witnessed; and I believe it may be said that so wast an assemblage of the intelligence of . France as had gathered together at once to do homage to a great and virtuous citizen, and, at the same. time, to manifest their antagonism to the existing state of things in this country (for there was no possibility of mistaking the political color of the occasion) -I believe that such a sight has scarcely ever before been seen. Something, I suppose, like three thousand of the most eminent men in France, in point of intellectual culture, left Paris yesterday morning for Angerville. And the assemblage was composed of men of all opinione, except perhaps those represented by the government, of whom there were only just enough present to remind one of those who were absent. It would be quite in valu to mention names amongst such a host. But when I say that M. Thiers, and M. Dufaure, M. de Falloux and the Prince de Broglie, the Duc de Noailles and the Count de Chateaubriand, M. Marie and M. Prevost-Paradol, M. de Lacy, M. Villemein and Jules Favre-all represented the partles and opinions of which they are the leaders and ornamentsyou will understand what a host of talent and eminence stand ever arrayed on the side of the opposition. I must not allow myself to repeat much of the language which I heard used as the train proceeded to its destination, further than to say the tone of the conversation was anything ADMISSION FIFTY CENTS. But if the demonstrations was remarkable on the side of Paris, it was still more so when we arrived, at the general rendezvous. There wefound deputations had come in, not only from all the eurrounding neighborhood, but from every part of France; and, what was remarkable, no representatives of legitimist opinions only, but of every shade of the liberal party. If, indeed, there could have been any doubt of the fact before, there could then remain none that the demonstration over the tomb of Berryer was, in reality, a continuation of the manifestation over the fomb of Baudin; and that the noble manner in which the former had come forward to support a claim to the grateful remembrance of hi tellow-citizens, on the part of one who differed so entirely in political views and feelings from himself, had made Berryer the champion of all the friends of political freedom. His letter in defence of Baudin and subscription to his monnment had created a community of feeling, at least for the moment, even between what used to be called the extreme Right and the extreme

When the sun at last struggled out through the warm mist and drizzle on Sunday, the atmosphere became oppressively hot, and the Bois was crowded with open carriages filled with people, "cooling" themselves on the 6th December ! It was smusing to see the velocipedists, who, tempted by the fineness of the day, were out in unusual numbers. But they had not taken sufficiently into account two antagonists to this species of gym. nastics; to wit, a warm, muggy atmosphere and oceans of mud. The rise of the ground, up to the Arc de' l'Etolle, completely exhausted the powers of some of these novel "equestrians:" and there they sat on their iron steeds, regular sticks-in-the-mud, with perspiring faces, amidat the laughter of the Sunday crowd.
