CONCLUSION OF YESTERDAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

The Court re-assembled at 3 o'clock. Milo Lord, sworn.--I am a private watchman, employed in the neighborhood of Tenth and Pine; at nine o'clock the night of the murder I was at Tenth and Clinton streets; saw no crowd of men and women come from Pine street laughang and making a noise; saw no one come over from the opposite corner. Cross-stamined - I was in the house on the

night of the murder; saw the prisoner. Q. Had the prisoner a white shirt on ? A. He

bad not.
