The revolutionary army, or Cacos, under the command of General Nissage Saget, have taken possession of Croix des Bouquets and advanced to Pont Rouge and besieged the town of Port an Prince. They are also reported to be in the visionity of Petionyille.

The President was absent at his headquarters at Petite Riviere de Nippes when the French admiral arrived, and he was sent for to meet him and to face the Cacos. It is thought that Salnave will not be able to sustain himself more than a month longer. General Hyppolite, Minister of Police, headed a conspiracy against the government, but it had been discovered and folled.
