THE TURBINES AT FAIRMOUNT.-The Water Committee of Councils, of which Mr. Hodgdon is Chairman, made an official inspection Chairman, made an official inspection yesterday afternoon of the new turbine wheel and pumps which have just been put in operation at the Fairmount Water Works. The new Jonyal Turbine has been put in under the direction of Chief Engineer Graeff, and Mr. Emilio Geyciin, the American agent of the Jouval patent, by whom the gearing of the new machinery was also designed. The wheel is the largest of the kind in the country, being ten feet three inches in diameter, and seventeen inches deep in the bucket; it drives two double acting torce-pumps, twenty-two inches in diameter and six feet stroke; these deliver their water into the reservoir through a main thirty-six inches dismeter and about two hundred and forty feet long. This main crosses the forebay nine feet above the ordinary level of the water, by means of wrought from ruspension links, the main itself forming the compression chord.

The designs for the new building, head gates, pumps, flume, suspended main, and complete arrangement of the work, are by Chief Engineer Graeff, whose long experience and selentific attainments cannot be too highly prized by the people of Philadelphia.

The capacity of the new turbine is about 8,000,000 gallons per day, and the whole pumping capacity of the works at present is about 31,000,000 gallons per day. When the series of turbines now contemplated are all completed (and Connot complete them a day too soon). Philadelphia will have capacity for a supply of water sufficient for its necessities for generations to come. vesterday afternoon of the new turbine wheel

The new mill-houses, with their superb ma The new mill-houses, with their superb machinery, will soon form one of the chief attractions of Philadelphia, and Fairmount, with all its picturesque improvements, will be a greater source of pride than ever to our people. The whole work on the mill-houses has been done in the most substantial manner, with cut stone walls, and roof of wrought-iron girders, with intermediate brief stables appropried upon wrought-iron and roof of wrought-iron girders, with intermediate brick arches, supported upon wrought-iron columns. The buildings when completed, will be fire-proof, enduring, and suitable for a work of the importance and magnitude required for the supply of water to this great city.

The introduction of the Jonval Turbine is place of the cumbrous old breast-wheels at Fairmount, has proved an immense economy of power and of money. The first turbine was put in, eighteen years ago, and has run from that time to this at a cost for ordinary repairs for the whole time, not exceeding one hundred dollars! During last summer, this wheel ran for three months, without stopping three minutes! No better test of the excellence of this admirable invention, or of the perfect way in which the contractor his done his work, could well be afforded than this.

The saving of water by these whoels is very great. The old breast-wheel expended thirty-three gallons of water in pumping one gallon into the reservoirs. The Jonval turbines now in operation consume about eight gallons in raising one. When the breast of the dam is raised two feet, as must eventually be done, to save the present great waste of water, the additional fall will enable the turbines to do their work at an expense of only about five gallons to one.
