The Philadelphis Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened its 821 icession in the Union M. E. Church, of this city, this morning, Bishop E. Thompson presiding. The place of meeting is one of our churches, rich in its associations; organized about 1860 as an offshot from St. George's. The present edifice was built over thirty years ago, and more sessions of Conferences have been held within its walls than in any other in the denomination.
