#### THETWITCHELLCASE

Another Application for a Writ of Error.

SUPREME COURT-Chief Justice Thompson and SUPREME COURT—Chief Justice Thompson and Justice Read, Agnew and Williams.—This morning, immediately after the opening of the Court, Mr. William Wheeler Hubbell appeared at the bar with a large bundle of papers, and addressing the Court, said: "May it please your Honors—In the case of George S. Twitchell, plaintiff, against the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, I present as the proprietation for an ellowance of a writed error app ication for an allowance of a writ of error and a reversal of the judgment. I claim the right and privilege to do so under the Constitution of the United States."

Chief Justice Thompson—We have already

passed upon this case after a very careful and Mr. Hubbell—But this presents new assign

ments of error. Chief Justice Thompson-When was the judgment entered in this case?

Mr. Hubbell—On the 30th of January.
Chief Justice Thompson—Then you are too late, but we will take the papers and look at

The bundle of papers presented to the Court consisted of the records of the trial; a manuscript recital of the assignments of error, and a printed book containing an argument by Mr. Hubbell designed to show that the verdict was against the

Mr. Hubbell, in this book, announces himself as "a member of the bar, who has for many years been engaged in professional and scientific purmits that he is accustomed to the examination of physical principles of all kinds, particularly when involved in suits." In his assignments of error, the principal one relied upon is that under the 5th and 6th articles of the amendments to the Constitution, it is provided that "in all criminal prosecutions the accused shall be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation," "be confronted with the witnesse against him." Mr. Hubbell contends that thes provisions in the constitution were not complied with before the trial, and that, therefore, the Governor had no right to sign the death-war-

rant, inasmuch as the judgment of the court was not "by due process of law."
