

CITY BULLETIN.

THE MORMONING BALL.—The annual ball of the Mormoning Ball Company was given last night at the Academy of Music. The attendance was unusually large. Look before you time appointed for the opening march, the parade circle and balcony were filled with ladies, and the upper tiers were opened for spectators. The interior of the building was decorated with hanging and numerous cages containing white-bling candy birds were hung across the dancing floor. The stage was set with the ball-room scene from the Sicilian Vespers. The orchestra was under the direction of Mr. Mark Hasker, and the prominent band was under charge of Theo. Herrmann. The dancing commenced shortly after nine o'clock, and was interrupted only by the presence of a testimonial to the Alderman William McMillin, President of the Company. This gift comprised a large diamond pin, a gold snuff-box inlaid with diamonds, and a large frame containing a photograph of the city, with the names of the many resolutions, handsomely engraved. The presentation speech was made by Charles W. Brooke, Esq., and was responded to by Lewis C. Cassidy, Esq. After the ceremony the dancing was resumed, and was continued until a late hour. The refreshment department was in charge of Mr. Adolph Proskauer, the well known caterer. The night passed off successfully.

FIRE.—About half-past 10 o'clock, last night, a fire broke out in the tannery of Stewart Allen, No. 938 North Front street. The building is a long, two-story frame, owned by Catherine S. Baker. The fire originated from one of the furnaces in the back part of the premises. The rear portion of the structure was destroyed, and the stock of Mr. Allen was greatly damaged by smoke and water. Mr. Allen's loss will be about \$5,000 and is not insured. The damage to the building was not serious.

This morning about one o'clock a fire broke out in the lot of a building on Coates street, near Landing avenue, occupied by Adam Weeber as a lager beer saloon. The fire commenced in the roof of the building, and was destroyed. The stock and fixtures of Mr. Weeber were much injured by water. Loss, \$500; insured in the Germania of New York. The fire communicated to the roof of the building, which was also burned off. The building was occupied by four poor families, whose household effects suffered by water to the extent of about \$1,000. The houses belonged to the city, being part of the property to be attached to Fairmount Park.

A CONFIDENTIAL MAN.—Frank W. White was arrested at Chestnut Hill yesterday, and will have a hearing at the Central Station this afternoon. About ten days ago he went to Germantown and represented himself as Dr. Frank Blair. He professed to be a Methodist, and joined the Methodist church in Germantown. He had written prayers, and class in the confidence of the other members. He then borrowed a large Webster's Dictionary from Rev. Dr. Garrow, but at the time appointed for returning the book neither White nor the dictionary could be found. He was afterwards discovered at Chestnut Hill, where he represented himself as a dentist, and was making arrangements to enter into business.
